

Lunches

A lunch service is offered by the General Store at Doreen on **Mondays and Wednesdays** and by JoJayz café on **Fridays**. If the children bring a clearly marked bag with their lunch order and the required money to the school in the morning, their lunch order will be delivered at lunchtime (we have two separate price lists for these). Children eat their lunch inside. Children may use the staffroom refrigerator to store their lunch if necessary. They also have access to heating facilities (microwave, sandwich maker), which are supervised. A wide variety of fruit is available to each student each day.

School Council

School Council meets at 7:30pm once a month. All parents, whether elected members or not, are most welcome to attend and participate in council discussions relating to any aspect of the school.

School Fees and Requisites

The school will provide the normal requisites, such as paper, books, pencils, rulers etc for children. A charge of \$40.00 per term will be levied for each student. This pays for requisites, Library Van levy and to assist us in providing the best education for your children. The levy is due at the beginning of each term, or you may pay the full amount at the commencement of the school year. Costs for excursions, camps, swimming, etc will be paid for by the parents as the need arises.

Sending Money to School

When forwarding money to school to pay for excursions etc please place it in an envelope bearing the child's name, the amount enclosed and the purpose, ie "Andrew Adams, \$2.00, Zoo Excursion". This avoids confusion as to who has paid. The school has envelopes specifically for this purpose, please ask for a supply.

Excursions

Excursions play a vital part in the school's curriculum as they provide first hand experiences for the children. After much thought on the most beneficial type of excursion for the grade/s concerned, and consideration of the likely cost to be incurred by the parents, a decision is reached on a particular venue and lead-up activities are incorporated into the teacher's program. Immediately after the excursion, follow-up work (based on the actual outing) is carried out which extends the children's knowledge in many areas.

In view of the importance placed on excursions with regard to the child's overall education, we greatly appreciate your full support for all excursions planned for your child's grade. The following two motions are now incorporated into the school policy.

"School Council is committed to children attending camping/excursion programs because these are vital aspects of the Educational Curriculum offered at this school."

"Total school and community involvement is necessary to ensure that costing of these programs be kept to a minimum."

For each excursion your child must bring a signed permission notice and the required money. Without the permission notice children cannot attend the excursion. Notices will be sent home in the week prior to the excursion.

Parent Participation

The Doreen Primary School welcomes participation by parents in the school program. Parents have much to offer the school and the children benefit greatly from increased parent/teacher interaction. Listed below are some of the ways in which you can take part, by the possibilities are unlimited. Please don't hesitate to suggest a way in which you would like to take part.

Some suggestions:-

- helping with programs in the classrooms
- assisting with cataloguing in the library area
- typing
- working with the children on computer skills
- story telling and reading to small groups of children
- taking children for an elective eg: music, cooking, woodwork, macrame, pottery,
- weaving, spinning, first aid, gardening, etc.....

Parking

The safest place for parking at the school is at either at the western end of the school ground or in the carpark at the end of the oval. These were built as a result of a large number of near accidents which occurred immediately outside the school in Doctor's Gully Road. **PLEASE NOTE:** There are **NO STANDING** signs outside the school on both sides of Doctor's Gully Road. There is also disabled parking in the two spaces nearest the basketball court. The Doctor's Gully Rd "pull in" should only be used for drop-off and pick ups that are quick. Another safe method is to come and pick up at 3.40p.m., as there is a supervising teacher on duty until 3.45p.m. or until all children are picked up. Please note that the area along the fence line of the western end is reserved for staff.

Art Smocks

To help protect your child's clothing while he/she is painting, etc all students should be provided with an appropriate art smock.

Library Van

We are fortunate to have the services of the MARC Van to supplement the school library. The MARC Van, which is a mobile resource for small schools in the area, visits each Monday. The driver of the van, Tristan, a Primary School Teacher, works with each class of children instructing them in the various skills necessary for use in the library. Children also then have opportunity to borrow books from this resource.

Physical Education

Young children normally have short periods of exercise each day and lead a very active life in general. It is most important that your child is dressed in comfortable clothes at all times to allow for freedom of movement.

One afternoon per week will be set aside for a sporting program. Shorts, tracksuit and running shoes will enable you child to fully participate.

The swimming program is reassessed each year. At present we attend the Whittlesea Outdoor Swimming Pool for 10 sessions during Term 4.

Gymastics program.- We also run a 4 week program throughout the year

Your Child's Belongings

All belongings should be clearly labelled with the child's name so that he/she can read and recognise it. These items include jumpers, coats, hats, shoes, lunch boxes, drink containers, school bags, etc: in fact any item brought to school. A lost property box is located in the Staffroom. Please check it if you have lost anything.

Labelling items greatly reduces the risk of losing them and saves the teachers, the parents and the children a great deal of searching time.

School Uniform

School uniform is compulsory. This was a decision made by the school community. Windcheaters, T-shirts, polo shirts and hats are available from the office. However plain navy blue windcheaters T-shirts and polo tops (without brand logos on them) are acceptable. Girls can wear a navy check dress which is available from Target, K mart or any other large store.

Punctuality

Punctuality is expected and, in the case of absence, a note of explanation should be sent to the class teacher upon the child's return, or sooner if the absence is to be a lengthy one.

Attendance

Regular attendance helps in developing

- Independent skills
- maintaining a sequential learning program
- social skills

Absences are a handicap to the child's progress. Perfect attendance is the goal of the healthy child – **BUT HOME IS THE BEST PLACE FOR A SICK CHILD.** Under normal circumstances a child should be at school on all school days unless ill.

Infectious Diseases – Exclusion Table

Some infectious diseases require exclusion from school as follows

Diphtheria	Medical Certificate
Scarlet Fever	Medical Certificate, or exclusion until anti-biotic treatment undertaken
Measles	Medical Certificate or 4 days from beginning of rash
Chicken Pox	At least 7 days or until lesions have healed.
German Measles (Rubella)	At least 4 days from the beginning of rash or until fully recovered
Hepatitis	Medical Certificate
Impetigo	Until Medical Treatment commenced, sores must be covered
Mumps	At least 14 days from the onset of symptoms.
Whooping Cough	For 5 days after starting anti-biotic treatment

These are, of course, the minimum exclusion periods. Sick children should NOT be sent to school. Some exclusions also apply to siblings, check the school office for details.

First Days

When you bring your child to school on the first day, he/she will be familiar with the surroundings after attending several transition days. Help your child to hang their bag and let the teacher/s know that they have arrived. Your child may want to play with others, encourage this and say good-bye. If they seem a little unsure play with them until the “bell” rings and then announce that you will have to go now and they will be going inside with the other children.

Doreen Primary School has a skilled staff of fully trained teachers so you can be confident that you child will be guided carefully through the varied school experiences that he/she is faced with. As a general rule, school adjustment is easier for the child and teacher after the parents leave and as distressing as it may seem at that moment things soon settle down as children commence the days activities.

Characteristics of Five Year Olds

As Prep grade children come to school they join a group of active, energetic youngsters who never wish to be still. They want to be first in line, the first in the room and they will push and shove to get there.

They are interested in many things. They love to handle many things, play with them, feel and sense differences in them. They like to start new activities but often lose interest in them before they finish them.

It's off “with the old” and “on with the new” with five year olds. They try to do only what they can accomplish and therefore accept, more or less, the responsibilities of school life – yet

they need help in the simplest decisions. They try to bring home messages but do not always succeed. In their play the group assumes a large place, yet they often play alone.

With his/her vivid imagination a five year old can be a fireman, a doctor, a policeman or a nurse all in the one recess period – then go home and tell of the great things he/she did in each role as if he/she really believes it.

We know school will be a marvellous new adventure for him/her. At first the new experience will be very tiring, so do not be surprised if he/she is very cranky and falls asleep when he/she gets home.

Helping Your Child Before Starting School

1. Can your child repeat his/her name and address to other people?
2. Can your child manage his/her own clothing, especially when going to the toilet?
Try to make sure that clothes are easy to get off and have fastenings that are easy to cope with.
3. Is your child reliably toilet trained? “Accidents” do happen, but if your child arrives home in underwear marked “Doreen Primary School”, we would appreciate the return of the item as soon as laundered.
4. Train him/her to take responsibility for personal belongings and to tidy any mess that he/she makes.
5. Does your child know the most direct and safest route to and from school?
6. Does your child know the correct way to cross a street, both with and without safety crossings?
7. Explain to your child the dangers of accepting rides from a stranger or person not authorised to do so.
8. Check that school bag fastenings and lunch boxes, etc are easy for you child to open and close.
9. Help your child to look forward to school and not to fear it. School is a happy place. Encourage him/her, but avoid too much false expectation.
10. Is your child provided with an opportunity for leaving you for a few hours without being upset?
11. Can your child use a handkerchief or tissue properly?
12. Encourage him/her to recognise his/her name on labels, etc.
13. Talk about the difference between “playtime” and “lunchtime”. Show your child what food you have packed and say when you expect it to be eaten.
14. Help your child to feel good about him/herself and learning. Try to encourage, not to blame. Good self concepts are an important factor to learning.
15. Read to your child. There is no better way to create a desire for reading.
16. Try to create some sense of number, size, length, height, volume, area, weight and time in everyday life. Join with your child in estimating, counting, calculating, etc.
17. Can your child count from 0 – 10?
18. Take time to discuss everyday happenings (but don’t force it). One of the most precious gifts you can give is your love and time.
19. If your child has been receiving therapy (eg Speech Therapy) it may be necessary to contact the Children’s Services to arrange on-going therapy through the Education Department’s facilities. Contact your child’s teacher for more information.
20. Can your child confidently tie his/her own shoe laces? If not valcro is a fantastic alternative

Your Child's Progress

At any given time the children in a class will have reached different standard in various subjects and skills. This is because –

- all children are different and schools are encouraged to make provision for their individual differences;
- children learn at different rates for a variety of reasons
- children's health, friendships, family circumstances and relationships with teachers influence their enthusiasm for learning.
- Children mature at different rates and this influences their learning rate and how they cope with the demands of the classroom.
- Children have their own patterns of learning and patterns of progress.

Parents usually have a very good idea as to whether their child is doing his/her best. Teachers may often wish to obtain information directly from parents and vice versa.
